
U.S.G.A. RULES GOVERN ALL PLAY EXCEPT WHERE MODIFIED BY LOCAL RULES

- Speed of play is 2 hours 10 minutes or less for 9 holes. 4 hours 20 minutes for 18 holes.
- When stopping power carts at tees and greens, keep all 4 tires on path surface.
- Carts must remain on paths on all par 3s, from bridge and through green on hole 18.
- Take carts to greenside path when you are 50 yards or further from the green.
- No children under age 5 allowed on course or range unless they are playing or practicing and have paid a fee. We suggest children under 6 wear a helmet.
- Every player must have a set of clubs. Licensed drivers only may operate power carts.
- Eagle Falls is a spikeless facility. All golfers must sign in.
- Fivesomes allowed only upon golf shop approval.
- · Rainchecks given only upon course closure.

- LOCAL RULES -


- Out of Bounds: defined by white stakes and fences bordering the course. A ball which crosses a railroad track defined as out of bounds and comes to rest beyond that track is out of bounds, even though it may be on another part of the course.
- If a ball strikes a telephone pole, guywire or wire, the shot must be replayed.

BLACK EAGLE FALLS 0-8 Handicap Recommended

During the 1804-05 winter, the Indians told Lewis and Clark they would find a Black Eagle's nest below the falls of the Missouri. On June 14, 1805, Captain Lewis saw the nest just as had been described by the Indians, confirming that he had found the Great Falls of the Missouri. Lewis and Clark called this falls the "Upper Pitch", and never used the name Black Eagle Falls.

RAINBOW FALLS 9-16 Handicap Recommended

In 1872, Thomas P. Roberts, a railroad surveyor named Rainbow Falls because of the rainbows which are often visible in the midst of the water as it tumbles over the rock shelf. Lewis and Clark labeled this falls the "Beautiful Cascade" or "Handsome Falls".

CROOKED FALLS 17-27 Handicap Recommended

Of the names given to falls on the Missouri by Lewis and Clark, only the name "Crooked Falls" has endured. Lewis wrote that the rock shelf cut "obliquely" across the river with a drop of 19 feet.

THE GREAT FALLS 28-Up Handicap Recommended

On June 13, 1805 Lewis and four men were walking overland in search of falls, and about noon, heard the "agreeable sound" of falling water. Lewis called the scene "the grandest sight I ever beheld". The name "Great Falls" was used by the Indians and most likely referred to the several falls; today, Great Falls refers to Ryan Dam.
